About This Guide

Maneuvering Through the Maze was originally produced in 1991 by the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health and Developmental Services. The impetus for the guide was the 1989 passage of *New Hampshire's Family Support* legislation (SB 195-FN-A) and the need for families to receive assistance with the coordination of community resources. In 2005 NH Family Voices, with the support of the NH Developmental Disabilities Council and The Disabilities Rights Center resurrected 'Maneuvering'. The challenge for families and individuals to find resources continues to exist and our hope is this guide book will be helpful to both parents and the professionals working with them.

Maneuvering Through the Maze is formatted to take the reader from birth to adulthood with listings of state health and human services agencies, educational resources, private associations and organizations that serve people with physical, developmental, mental health and chronic illnesses and their families. We have also added organizations and services that can be accessed by all state residents, such as housing, childcare, etc. Programs should be contacted directly for more detailed information.

Every effort has been made to provide complete and accurate information. We apologize for any omissions and encourage readers to contact us with suggestions. This information does not serve as an endorsement of any individual organization, agency or the quality of services.

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Tips For Getting Answers to Your Questions

Families/parents/consumers need to find easy ways to get information about available resources and services to meet their needs. Here are some tips to help

Keep Trying

"It's about not giving up and about asking a lot of questions. Persistence is the word I use. Pushy, sometimes yes. But persistent is really it because you don't have to be pushy, you just have to not give up."

- ♦ Keep calling and keep asking questions.
- ♦ Ask for names and phone numbers of other people to contact.
- ♦ If the recorded voice on the phone is confusing, often you can just stay on the line. Then you will be connected with a person.
- ♦ Written request or email may result in a prompt response.

Keep Notes

"Get organized. Write down when you called, who you talked with, and what the conversation was about. You're going to need to go back to that at some point - you're not going to be able to remember it all."

Keep track of:

- ♦ Who you talked with, the phone number, and the date of the call.
- ♦ The name of the organization and the information you were given.
- ♦ What you and what they agreed to do - and by what date.
- ♦ Their ideas about other people to contact.

Educate Yourself

"Families need to educate themselves about all aspects of their child's special needs."

- ♦ Get information from your providers, the library, other parents, or the internet.
- ♦ Make sure the information you receive is correct and up to date. Ask your doctor or health provider about the information you find.

Information to Have at Your Finger Tips

Many agencies and service providers need basic information when looking at what your family may qualify for. Having this information written out ahead of time can save time and energy.

Early Supports and Services

Family-centered early supports and services are an array of services for infants and toddlers, birth through age 2 years who have a diagnosed condition that may result in developmental delays or children who are at risk for developmental delays if early intervention is not provided.

♥ In New Hampshire, family-centered early supports and services are administered by the Department of Health and Human Services through the Division of Developmental Services. Intake for services is done through the Area Agency system found on page 115 of this guide.

Eligibility Criteria (Who can participate?)

- Infants and Toddlers birth to age 3 years
- 33% delay in:
 - physical development (includes vision and hearing)
 - Learning (cognitive) delay
 - Communication delay
 - Social/emotional delay
 - Adaptive developmental delay
- At risk for a developmental delay. Examples include but are not restricted to:
 - Low birth weight (less than 1500 grams)
 - Respiratory Distress Syndrome
 - Nutritional problems that interfere with growth and development
 - Parent age less than 18 years
- Established Condition. Examples include but are not restricted to:
 - Genetic disorder
 - Neurological disorder
 - Metabolic disorder
 - Severe attachment disorder

Family - Centered Early Supports and Services

Family Tips

Parenting a child can be a challenge. There is a fine balance between hopes and dreams and ups and downs. During the first three years of your child's life, Early Supports and Services can make a big difference. Beginning early to enhance your child's development has benefits for you, your child, your family and your community.

When calling the Area Agency (page 117) for information, ask for the *Early Supports and Services Intake Coordinator*. This person will be able to give you specific information about the process, programs, and how services are delivered in your area of the state.

Questions Parents Might Want To Ask about Early Supports and Services

- How will service providers working with my child be determined?
- What kind of training/experience does this person have with children who have needs like my child?
- How will my child's primary care doctor or pediatrician be involved?
- How much of my time, my child's or other family members' time will it take?
- Is transportation available?
- Is there a fee for the services?
- What testing will be done and why?
- Will my child have individual attention and individual goals?
- Could the services happen at a time and place that are better for our family?
- Are the services flexible? Can changes be made after services begin?
- What type of supports is available for myself and other members of my family?
- What are the different ways therapy can be provided for my child?

"Our son was almost 18 months of age and didn't seem to be talking much. We had his hearing tested and knew that he was hearing, but he wasn't repeating words. Our family doctor suggested Early Intervention. What a difference it has made in our lives. They helped us learn how to teach him and today he is a talkative three year old."

What Happens At Age Three?

If your child continues to need therapies and educational services beyond the age of three then at least 6 months before your child's 3rd birthday, your Service Coordinator refers your child to your school district. This can change where and how services are provided. In early intervention, this change is called transition. The Individual Disability Education Act (IDEA), the Federal special education law, requires a written plan for this transition. A transition meeting must take place at least 90 days before your child turns three. Your transition plan will identify special education and community-based services your child may need.

A team of providers from the school district, Early Supports and Services and you, as the parent will determine if your child is eligible for preschool special education services. They will discuss the results of their tests with you and give you information about your rights. If your child is eligible, their services will be provided through an Individual Education Plan (IEP).

Your Service Coordinator will assist you in planning a move to other possible services if your child is not eligible for special education preschool services.

Tips for the Transitioning to Special Education Pre-School

- Make a "wish list" of goals that you would like to see your child achieve.
- Visit school programs available for your child. Look at the variety of programs (daycare settings, special education preschools, integrated regular preschools) and the people available to meet your child's unique needs in your community.
- Get to know the receiving teacher as early as possible. Set up a time to meet without your child to talk about your dreams and "wish list".
- Ask about a parent orientation packet to take home to read. If this doesn't exist, ask for a written explanation of:
 - Child's proposed schedule.
 - Explanation of emergency procedures.
 - Explanation of food services.
 - Explanation of parent participation.
 - Other pertinent program information.
- Learn about the provisions of IDEA (Individual Disability Education Act) for your child's education including the following:
 - Individual Education Plan (IEP)
 - Multidisciplinary team
 - Related Services
 - Your right to access your child's records
 - Your right to choose to accept and sign the IEP and your right to contest it.
- Be **CONFIDENT** in your knowledge of your child.

Child Development Evaluation Resources

Child Development Services Network

The Child Development Services Network is a collaborative, community-based approach to the provision of state-of-the-art diagnostic evaluation services to children from birth through 6 years of age suspected of or at risk for altered developmental progress.

The Child Development Network Services provides:

- ♦ Team evaluation consisting of a pediatric neuro-developmental examination, an assessment of the child's current developmental and cognitive functioning, speech and language, and motor development.
- ♦ A review of the child's current educational and treatment program when indicated.
- ♦ Post-evaluation recommendations for normative, therapeutic and/or educational services and monitoring progress. These include:
 - Identification of the child's learning style and school program needs
 - Referral to community resources for additional diagnostic testing, counseling or treatment services
 - Assistance in finding appropriate community support and educational resources
 - Follow-up monitoring or re-evaluation

PARENT TIPS FOR GETTING EVALUATIONS PAID FOR

- ♦ Ask your child's doctor to recommend someone to do the evaluation
- ♦ Call the evaluation site - Ask:
 - ♦ How long is the wait for an appointment?
 - ♦ Will they accept your health insurance?
 - ♦ What is the process required by the provider?
 - ♦ Do they have suggestions, or will they work with you to give the information the insurance company will need to cover the evaluation?
 - ♦ Do they know of other funding sources if your insurance will not cover.
- ♦ Document date of call, to whom you spoke, and all responses.
- ♦ Send follow up letter which thanks someone for their assistance and reiterates what was agreed upon.
- ♦ Keep all correspondence and documentation in case you need to appeal a decision.

Head Start

A child must be found eligible for early supports and services (ESS) prior to their eligibility for M.I.C.E. Program services. Children with diagnosed vision and hearing impairments are eligible for ESS under an established condition but must have the developmental evaluation to determine eligibility.

Services provided are:

- Developmental evaluation (in conjunction with early supports and services staff) with the emphasis on the impact of a visual/hearing impairment on learning and development;
- consultation and technical assistance provided to early supports and service teams;
- direct services to children and families.

Child Care for Children with Special Needs

If you have a child with a developmental disability or other special need, it can be daunting to think about child care. You may be returning to work full or part-time, or just need time to attend to other responsibilities. Naturally, you are concerned about what is best for your child. You may also wonder what restrictions you will face, or how available care will be. It is important to know that licensed or certified child care providers cannot refuse to take a child based on disability, and must make reasonable accommodations for your child's special needs. However, you may still need to make several decisions when considering which care is best for your child.

The right child care setting can be extremely beneficial to your child--socially, physically, and intellectually. It can provide you with a needed break and rest from care. Child care may also allow you to return to work and receive needed health insurance benefits.

Here are some things to consider as you look for child care:

- ♦ Are staff members open and enthusiastic about accommodating your child?
Or are they at least willing to give it a try?
- ♦ Are staff trained and supported to accommodate children with special needs? If not, how might they get the training they need?
- ♦ Do staff members understand the medical/therapeutic procedures and assistive technology necessary to support your child?
- ♦ Are you willing to show them what needs to be done?
- ♦ Is the setting (including playground) accessible to your child? Do any books or toys feature children with special needs?
- ♦ Are staff members willing to work with your child's therapists to plan classroom activities?
- ♦ Are staff willing to help your child develop the skills that your family believes are important, and include your child in the same activities as all the other children?

Talk with your child's health care and early intervention providers for suggestions. Keep in mind that you know your child better than anyone. Therefore you will need to weigh options with your own child's and family's needs. Once you've selected the type and amount of child care that is best for your family, good communication between you and the child care staff will also be of great benefit to your child. Let staff know about your child's preferences, schedules, and specific medical needs and contacts.

Things to Think About When Choosing Child Care

Look For

- Responsive, nurturing, warm interactions between caregiver and children.
- A Clean, safe, and healthy indoor and outdoor environment, especially napping, eating and toileting areas.

Ask

- How many children there are for each adult. The fewer the children for each adult, the better for your child. You want your child to get plenty of attention. The younger your child, the more important this is. Babies need an adult to child ratio of no more than 1:4 (one adult for four infants), while four-year-olds can do well with a ratio of 1:10 (one adult for ten children).
- Find out how many children are in the group. The smaller the group, the better. Imagine a group of 25 two-year olds with five adults, compared to a group of 10 with two adults. Both groups have the same adult to child ratio. Which would be calmer and safer? Which would be more like a family?
- Ask about the caregivers' training and education. Caregivers with degrees and/or special training in working with children will be better able to help your child learn. Are the caregivers involved in activities to improve their skills? Do they attend classes and workshops?
- Check how long caregivers have been at the center or providing care in their homes. It's best if children stay with the same caregiver at least a year. Caregivers who come and go make it hard on your child. Getting used to new caregivers takes time and energy that could be spent on learning new things.
- Can I visit at any time?
- How do they handle discipline?
- What do they do if a child is sick?
- What would they do in case of an emergency?
- Request to see a copy of their license or other certification?

Stay Involved... Ask Yourself...

- How can I work with my caregiver to resolve issues and concerns that may arise?
- How do I keep informed about my child's growth and development while in care?
- How can I network with other parents?

The BCCL ensures that children attending NH child care programs are in safe and healthy environments and are provided with care, supervision and developmentally appropriate activities that meet each child's physical and emotional needs, through on-site evaluations, monitoring, and investigations that ensure compliance with applicable NH Statutes and Administrative Rules, approval and issuance of licenses, and initiation of appropriate disciplinary action when necessary for compliance and the protection of children.

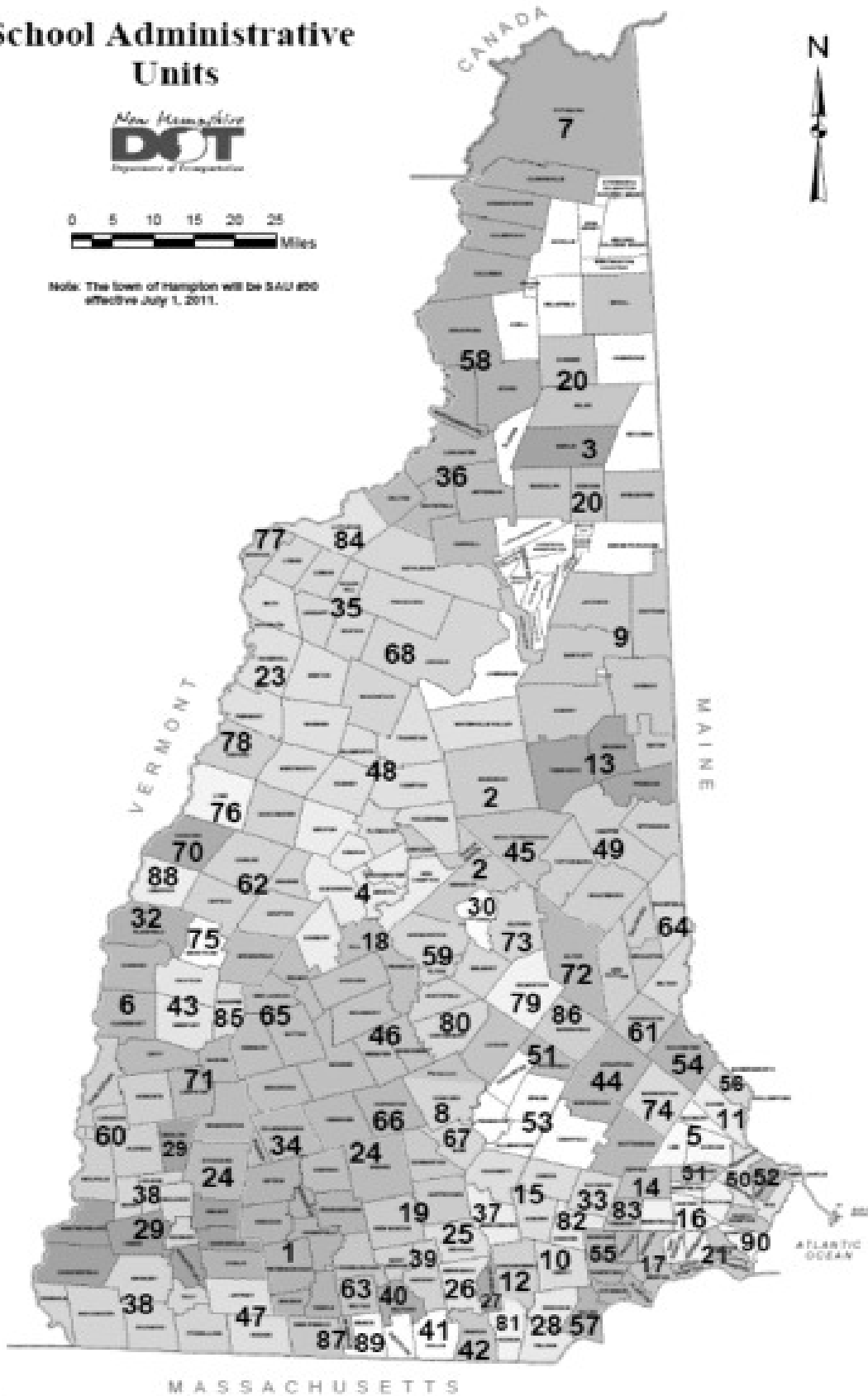



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Home Schooling

Home schooling is when a parent takes full responsibility for providing education for their child. For many home schoolers, this means being taught at home. For others, it means learning at a cooperative school, or even learning from several places all at once. Some attend public school for some subjects - or even just go there for lunch to visit with their friends.

Each program is unique to the child, and is decided upon by the parent. Here in NH, you do not have to be a certified teacher or become accredited in any way. All you have to be is a concerned parent, willing to take on the responsibility of providing your child's education.

Legally, all you need to do is notify your district of your intent to home school by a written letter. Samples of letters and state requirements can be found on the NH Department of Education website, www.ed.state.nh.us/ or for more information call the NHDOE/Home Education at (603) 271-3188.

Guidelines for Choosing a Special Education Advocate

Many parents choose to use a special education advocate to support them in getting what children need in special education. Non-lawyer advocates do not have a license to practice law, and they are not attorneys. They provide their services according to the laws of their state. (NH does not have any laws governing educational advocates). Many advocates have training and experience to help you beyond giving you moral support. Advocates can be professionals with training in special education and advocacy, they can be paraprofessionals such as paralegals, or they can be nonprofessional volunteers. They may or may not charge a fee for their services. (The Council of Parent Attorneys and Advocates, Inc. (COPAA), uses the term "special education advocate" and "advocate" to refer to individuals who advocate for parents and families, but are not attorneys).

Select a trained, experienced advocate

Unlike attorneys, no certificate authority exists to certify advocates at this time. However, special education advocates do have training opportunities, and many have years of experience and training. When you interview an advocate, you may want to work with, you need to ask about their education and training. You should also ask whether the advocate stays current in the field by getting updated training and education through workshops, conferences, continuing education programs, or seminars. Do not hesitate to ask for references from the advocate. You are the one making the hiring decision.

Select an advocate with special education experience

Experienced advocates can often get things done when others cannot. They should be familiar with the local service providers, evaluators, local school districts and special education administrators and the options they offer, and local customs. Ask about their knowledge of IDEA and other law/regulations affecting the education of students with disabilities.

Advocates also may have specific skills and knowledge about evaluations, certain disabilities, IEPs and other educational negotiations, behavioral supports and discipline, document management, fact investigations, and other areas. They may also have alternative dispute resolution skills, such as mediation and facilitation skills. Ask your advocate about his or her experience and specific skills.

Select an advocate who understands your child

You should expect an advocate to spend time visiting your child. Each child is a unique human being and has individual educational needs. Your advocate should be able to explain to you how your child's disability will affect him or her at school. Advocates are not diagnosticians and they are not education evaluators. But, a working knowledge of your child's disability, or a willingness to become educated about your child's disability, is a quality any good advocate should have.

Guidelines for Choosing a Special Education Advocate

Advocates and attorneys

Non-lawyer advocates are not attorneys or members of the bar. Some advocates and paralegals are supervised by attorneys or work with public interest organizations, like Protection and Advocacy agencies. Others work independently in their own offices. You can ask an advocate if they work with an attorney. But, it is not necessary that a lawyer oversee or supervise an advocate, or that an advocate even have a relationship with an attorney. Many experienced advocates work completely on their own or with other advocates who are not licensed attorneys. Also consider this: You should decide what you want in an advocate and what kind of assistance you need.

Select an advocate who understands his or her professional limits

Professional advocates may give you legal information and help you negotiate and resolve disputes. But, they are not lawyers, and cannot give you the same type of legal advice as attorneys. An experienced, well trained advocate should help you recognize when you should seek the services of a lawyer. You and your advocate should discuss your case and whether it would be appropriate to hire an attorney based on the facts and individual situation.

Other questions to ask

You can ask what an advocate charges and how you will be billed. You can ask how the fees are determined, and whether they will be hourly or a flat rate basis. Find out who keeps the copies of your child's records at the advocate's place or business, and how your child's file will be maintained and returned to you when you need them. Discuss communications, how you and your advocate will keep each other informed.

You, the parent, must make all of the final decisions about your child's case. After meeting with the advocate ask yourself if you:

- Will be comfortable working closely with this person
- Are confident the advocate has the experience and skill to handle your case
- Understand the advocate's explanation of what your case involves
- Understand the proposed fee agreement

Guidelines for Choosing an Attorney to Represent Your Child's Interest in Special Education

If you have a child with a disability, you may find that you need legal support to get the educational services your child needs. Attorneys who have licenses to practice law provide legal advice, help and support; they can represent you in court and in due process hearings. Licensed lawyers are accountable to strict rules of legal procedures and ethics.

Like all other lawyers, special education attorneys may be in private practice or they may practice in a public service agency such as a Protection and Advocacy agency, Legal Aid, Legal Clinic, or other similar organization. Choosing an attorney is an important decision. Attorneys' styles vary just as parents' styles do. Choose an attorney who is most compatible with your personality and objectives. This basic guide will help you as you select an attorney who will be helpful. Please keep in mind that before an attorney can answer some of your questions, the attorney may want to review your child's educational records and other related records.

Consider the attorney's special education expertise and knowledge

The law in special education cases can be complex. Although the training lawyers receive prepares them to deal effectively with legal complexities, law schools commonly do not teach special education law as a specific body of law. Attorneys who practice special education law should have suitable training and experience in this field. You want to make sure that they have the special education law experience you are looking for.

Find out if the lawyer you are considering routinely handles special education cases. Good lawyers in other fields of law often become motivated to begin practicing special education law. Special education lawyers also may be parents of children with disabilities. Knowledge and experience in other fields of law is one feature of an attorney's practice that may be important. Ideally, attorneys who help parents in this field know the various federal and state laws and regulations about disabilities, civil rights, and special education. Special education attorneys should also know the current education court decisions from the federal and state courts as well as their state's administrative decisions.

Select an attorney with the special education experience you need

Practicing special education law and resolving special education conflicts call for many different skills. Special education lawyers routinely conduct simple negotiations, mediations, administrative hearings (due process hearings), or go to court for their clients. Consider the experience the attorney has in each of these areas. Ask the attorney about his or her experience. You should feel free to ask for references. You are the one making the hiring decision.

Practicing special education lawyers should be familiar with the local service providers, evaluators, local school districts and the special education administrators in the school districts.

Guidelines for Choosing an Attorney

They should also have knowledge of local customs and the education optional choices that are available . They should know about evaluations, IEP issues and details, disabilities, behavioral supports, discipline issues, document management, fact investigations, formal and informal negotiations for needed services, and other areas that are common to special education cases. A lawyer should be familiar with the state's due process hearing procedures, hearing officers, mediation process, and the process of filing a complaint with the state. If you think you may go to federal court over a dispute, the lawyer should be familiar with federal court procedures and know about the local courts.

Possible outcomes of the case

Each special education case is unique because each student's particular educational needs are unique. In addition, special education cases may include dynamics that other law cases do not. However, an experienced special education attorney should be able to review your child's education records and give you a range of possible outcomes. A lawyer will help you carefully weigh the advantages and the disadvantages of your case. Do not expect an attorney to guarantee you an outcome.

Ask how the attorney charges for his or her work

You should not hesitate to ask attorneys what their rates are and how they will bill you for professional services. Most attorneys will not begin work without an agreement, something called an engagement agreement or letter. Attorneys should tell you what you should expect. They should tell you what the extent of their representation is going to be (what they are going to do for you). They should also tell you about how they set their fees; what is expected of you in terms of paying for expenses; whether they work by the hour or whether they work on a flat rate basis; what the retainer (if any) will be used for; and terms of engagements.

Understand your role as parents

Parents play a vital role in every special education case. Lawyers cannot make decisions for you. They can give you legal advice and tell you what to expect. But you, as parent of the student, are responsible for making decisions. You must decide whether to accept or reject an IEP, whether to settle your conflict with the school informally and what the terms of a settlement will be, and other such decisions.

Educational Transition Checklist

This is a quick checklist to keep in mind as the transition from school begins to happen.
Everyone has a part to play in successful transitions to adulthood.

The Role of the Student

- Express opinions and exercise choice.
- Attend transition planning and conference meetings.
- Take an active role in meetings, such as issuing invitations, facilitating, taking notes and / or disseminate minutes.
- Listen and be attentive during meetings.
- Be an assertive, tireless self-advocate.
- Participate in self evaluations.
- Be respectful of others in the community, on the job, and at school.
- Gather information about schools and service providers and ask detailed questions along the way.
- Recognize that some jobs, homes, post-secondary education institutions (colleges or universities) and activities are unsatisfactory and not good matches.
- Realize that no job is perfect and that many jobs require some unpleasant work.

The Role of the Family

- Advocate for functional curriculum that will prepare students for work and community life.
- Include goals for community job training, if related to achieving desired outcomes, in your son/daughter's transition plan.
- Investigate post-secondary education options with your son/daughter and get information about admissions requirements, accessibility, adaptations and supports available to students with disabilities.
- Maintain close communication with teachers throughout the school years.
- Attend all transition IEP conferences.
- Communicate the value of work to your son/daughter.
- Emphasize behaviors that will support employment, post-secondary education and community living.
- Visit employment providers and understand the different ways people are supported in employment.
- Visit community living providers in the area include small personalized homes or supported living arrangements.

The Role of the School

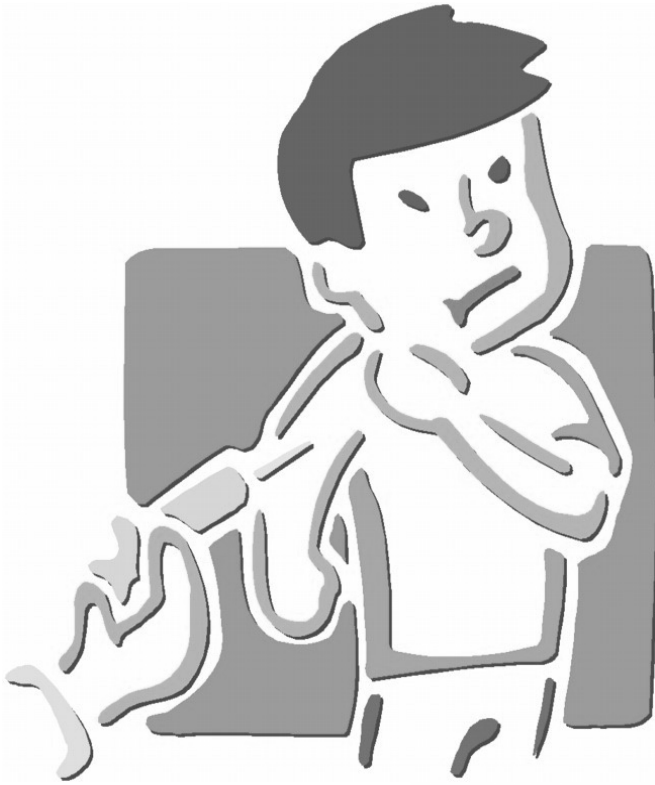
- Provide integrated education that emphasizes students' involvement with peers without disabilities and focuses on the building of integrated peer support networks.
- Involve students and parents in selecting valued activities for the transition IEP.
- Provide functional curriculum that emphasizes work, leisure, and personal management activities in a community-based training program.
- Provide curriculum that prepares students with disabilities for post-secondary education.
- Provide a variety of community job training opportunities for all students.
- Develop and disseminate a Transition Manual for students and parents that describes local services.
- Provide parent education and training on current program and post-high school opportunities.
- Communicate and build ties with the business community.
- Develop individualized student resumes and portfolios.
- Identify desired transition outcomes and develop a transition plan for each student as part of the IEP process.
- Initiate an interagency agreement to establish timelines and responsibility for transition planning activities.

The Role of Adult Service Providers

- Participate in formal transition planning meetings for high school students; provide requested information and follow through with applications for service.
- Work with school personnel to overlap services during the students' last year.
- Collect and disseminate information on service recipient outcomes in local services.
- Implement programs that reflect professional best practices and support normalized adult lifestyles for individuals with disabilities. In general, adult service programs should be designed to promote economic self-sufficiency, relationships with non-disabled peers, exercise of choice, development of new skills, and community integration.
- Ensure that each student graduates with competitive employment or a job that meets supported employment guidelines, if student desires.

Community Health Programs

The Child Health Program

Through this program, the Maternal and Child Health Section funds community health centers and health agencies to provide health care services to children in their community. Services are targeted to low-income, uninsured, or underinsured children. Care is provided through office visits and home visits, and is free or available by a sliding fee scale, depending on the child or family's financial situation.

Child and Family Health Support Services

Eight community health agencies in the state receive funding from the Maternal and Child Health Section to provide "Child and Family Health Support Services". These services are to help families where children may already have a health care provider but need additional services. They can also provide services such as:

- ♦ Helping parents enroll a child on NH Healthy Kids, if the child is eligible
- ♦ Helping parents with coordinating care and getting other needed services
- ♦ Providing information on topics such as a child's growth, development, and safety, and
- ♦ If the child does not have a health care or provider (or "medical home"), or dentist, parents can get help with finding one for their child.

These services are conducted in person or by telephone. These services are used primarily by children from birth through age ten, but are available for children up to age 19.

Early Hearing Detection & Intervention

In New Hampshire, all hospitals with birth facilities offer newborn hearing screening before babies go home. Babies who do not pass their hearing screening are referred for hearing testing by qualified audiologists.

Hearing screening is quick, easy, and does not hurt. Many infants sleep through the screening. Special hearing screening equipment is needed. Hospitals use Oto Acoustic Emissions (OAE) or Auditory Brainstem Response (ABR) equipment. An OAE screening uses tiny earphones placed in the infant's ear. It is done while the baby is sleeping or very quiet. The machine records the ear's response to sound. An ABR screening uses three sensors placed on the infant's head. It is done while the infant is sleeping. The machine measures the brain's response to sound.

Infants who do not pass their hearing screening are referred to *Level I Pediatric Audiology Diagnostic Centers* for special testing. Audiologists at these Centers have the skills and equipment needed to test infants and toddlers. Diagnostic testing results are reported to the infant's primary care provider and the EHDI Program. Babies identified with hearing loss may be referred for other services.

Passing a newborn hearing screening means that the baby could hear at the time of the screening. Hearing loss can occur at any age. A hearing screening should be done any time there is a concern about hearing.

Pediatric Vision Screening

Cooing, sitting up, and crawling are signs that your baby is growing. Your baby's vision has stages of development too, but the signs marking progress are not so obvious. For many months to come, those little eyes will be the windows he/she uses to learn almost everything about their new world.

Many eye conditions have no symptoms that can be identified by a parent or in a well baby check-up. Early detection is the best way to ensure your child has healthy eyes and appropriate development of vision, now and in the future.

InfantSEE®, developed by the American Optometric Association and The Vision Care Institute of Johnson & Johnson Vision Care Inc., is a public health program designed to ensure that eye and vision care becomes an integral part of infant wellness care to improve a child's quality of life. Through InfantSEE participating optometrists provide a no-cost comprehensive infant eye and vision assessment within the first year of life.

Healthy Kids Medical Insurance

NH Healthy Kids provides free or low-cost health insurance to uninsured New Hampshire children. Healthy Kids (HK) premiums are based on family size and income. Income includes any income earned from working or self-employment and unearned income such as child support, alimony, Social Security Disability (SSDI), other Social Security payments, unemployment, Veteran's, or Worker's Compensation benefits, or any income received on a regular basis.

Your family's income may be adjusted to reflect certain additional expenses such as Child or Adult Day Care so you can work, Court-Ordered Child Spousal Support or Wage Garnishment.

The non-financial eligibility requirements are:

- **Age:** Your child must be under the age of 19.
- **Residency:** Your child must be a NH resident.
- **Citizenship:** Your child must be a US citizen or an eligible qualified non-citizen.
- **Insurance Status:** Your child may be eligible for Healthy-Kids Gold regardless of insurance status. In addition, children who qualify for the Healthy Kids Silver program must be uninsured for six consecutive months prior to enrolling. Children who qualify for the Healthy Kids Buy-In program must be uninsured for three consecutive months prior to enrolling. This rule may not apply for certain reasons. For example, if the child lost their coverage because their parent was laid off, this requirement may be waived.
- **Social Security Number:** Your child does not have to provide an SSN if your family's monthly income places your child in the Healthy-Kids Silver program. However, if your child is eligible for Healthy-Kids Gold, your child's SSN must be provided.

Healthy Kids Silver

Healthy Kids Silver is low-cost health and dental coverage for eligible uninsured children in families whose income is above the limit for Healthy Kids Gold. Coverage is provided through a managed care plan from Harvard Pilgrim Health Care. Dental services are available through the Northeast Delta Dental network of dentists.

Special Eligibility: Your child must be uninsured for six consecutive months prior to enrollment. This requirement may be waived for good cause. Job loss or cases of domestic violence are examples of good cause reasons.

Cost: There is a monthly premium cost. Cost is based on income and family size. A co-payment (usually \$10/20) is required for some services. Co-payments are due at the time of the visit. Preventive care, including well-child and dental checkups, are fully covered.

Premium costs have a family maximum for the number of children enrolled. The total of premiums and co-payments cannot exceed 5% of your yearly family income.

Healthy Kids Buy-In

The Buy-In program does not receive any state or federal funding. Families who are not eligible for State sponsored coverage through Healthy Kids may be able to buy into the Silver program. Co-payments and benefits are the same, excluding maternity services, at a monthly cost per child. There are income guidelines for this program.

Eligibility for the Buy-In program is available to:

- Families with children ages 1 - 19 with the family's income falls within the Healthy Kids Buy-In income guidelines
- Non-citizen children who are legal residents may be enrolled in the Buy-In program
- Children over the age of 19 who are still enrolled full time in high school
- Children who have been uninsured for three consecutive months prior to enrollment

Healthy Kids Gold is the NH Medicaid program for children up to age 19 with income no higher than 185% of the federal poverty income limits or, if the child is younger than 1 year and has no other health insurance coverage, income can be no higher than 300% of the federal poverty income limits. (see page 159 for FPL) No premium.

NH Medicaid Medical Assistance Eligibility

These are "doorways of eligibility" for qualifying for Health Kids Gold Medicaid services, or Medicaid for adults (over the age of 19). These require a medical eligibility determination in addition to a financial eligibility determination.

- ♦ Home Care for Children with Severe Disabilities (HC-CSD): commonly referred to as Katie Beckett: requires children to meet SSI eligibility criteria for children and an institutional (nursing facility) level of care. Only considers the child's income and resources for financial eligibility. The coverage is the same as Healthy Kids Gold.
- ♦ Aid to the Needy Blind (ANB): a category of eligibility that requires an individual (child or adult) to be diagnosed as legally blind. The visual acuity in the better eye can be no greater than 20/200.
- ♦ Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled (APTD): an adult service category that requires individuals between ages 18 to 64 to meet the Social Security impairment severity requirements and to be unable to perform substantial gainful activity for 48 consecutive months as a result of the impairment.

NH HB 790 - Dependent Care Expansion

In July, 2007 the NH Legislature passed the "Dependent Care Expansion" that required certain insurance plans to expand the definition of dependent to include a subscriber's child who:

- ♦ is less than 26 years of age,
- ♦ is unmarried,
- ♦ is a resident of NH, **or** is enrolled at a public **or** private institution of higher education, and
- ♦ is not provided coverage as a named subscriber under any other group or individual health plan or entitled to benefits under certain governmental programs.

This gives families the opportunity to keep their child on their health insurance until their 26th birthday. For more information call the NH Insurance Department (below).

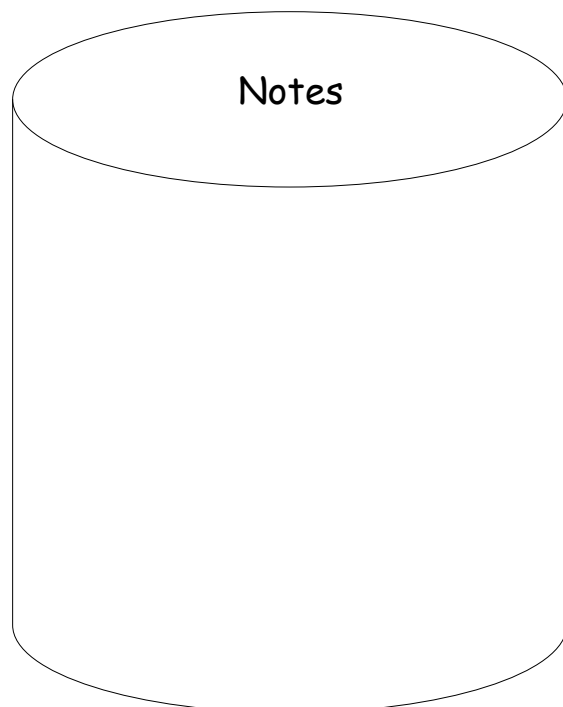
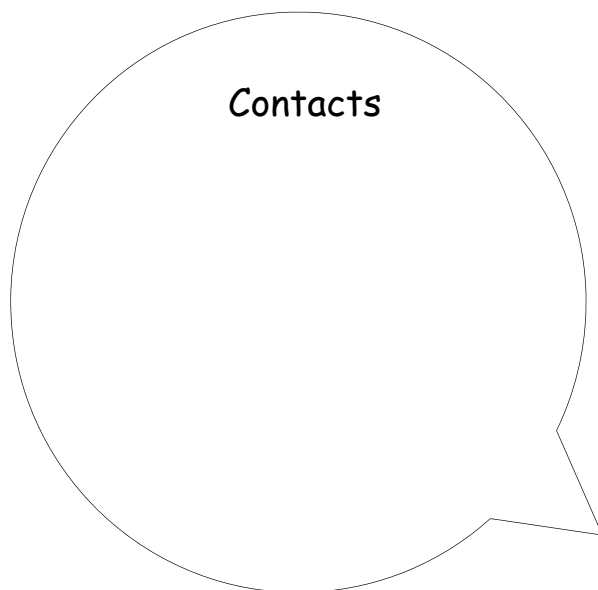

Home Health Care

There are different types of caregivers who provide home health care services to children with special health care needs. They may be an RN, LPN, LNA (Licensed Nurse Assistant), or a Personal Care Attendant (PCA).

You, the parent or guardian, should be able to interview and have the final approval of the home based caregiver for your child. You should decide if your child or other family members should participate in the interview and in preparation make a list of questions applicable to the care of your child. Some suggested questions for the interview might be:

- ♥ Where have you worked before?
- ♥ What were your duties?
- ♥ How do you handle people who are angry, stubborn, or fearful?
- ♥ Are you able to lift or transfer from a wheelchair to bed?
- ♥ Is there anything in the job description that you are uncomfortable doing?

Consider what qualities/skills you require and what you can train a good candidate to do. Be sure that you have a chance to watch the interactions between the in-home caregiver and the family member for whom he or she will be providing care.

It is natural to feel nervous and unsure about having someone you may not know come into your home to provide care or other services for your child with special health care needs. To ease your fears and to help you get a good start in your relationship with your child's in-home caregiver, here are some steps to take *before* services begin:

- ♥ Learn as much as you can about the scope or description of services to be provided, and about the agency that employs the person who will be your child's caregiver.
- ♥ Be open and honest about your expectations and discuss them with the agency management. Find out what the agency expects of you.
- ♥ Ask about your rights and options in case you are not satisfied with the care or services your child receives. You may want to ask the agency for a different caregiver or switch to another agency altogether.
- ♥ Talk with other families who use in-home caregivers and learn from their experiences.

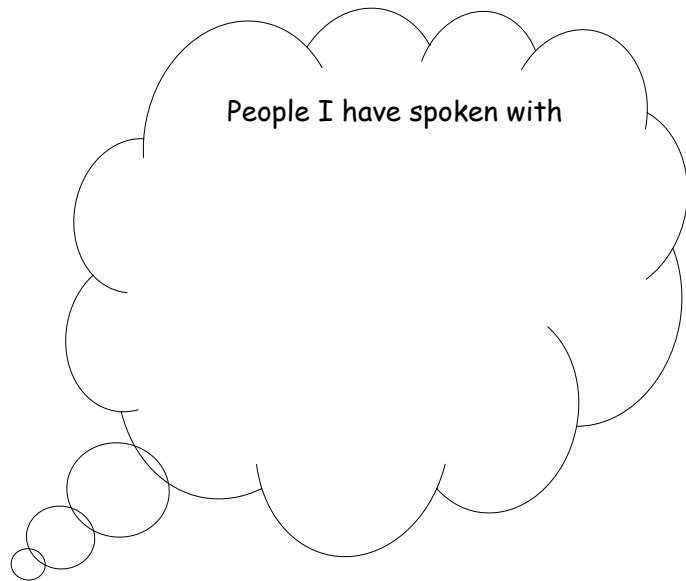

Residential Services: provides round-the-clock nursing care and medical supervision by a team of physicians who specialize in the care of children who have experienced a traumatic injury or who were born with a developmental delay. Accepts children between the ages of 2 and 22 and who are medically stable. Applicants can be admitted with tracheotomy, catheters, feeding tubes, and orthopedic needs. The program rates are generally covered by private health insurers or Medicaid.

Respite Services: The respite program serves families throughout NH who are caring for children with complex medical needs and who need a break from a sometimes stressful home schedule. Weekend, a week or longer respite is available.

Transitioning to Adulthood.....



How To Find and Use Adult Health Care Providers

As you move into adulthood and if you have had a pediatrician, you will need to look for an adult doctor. Moving to a different town due to school or a change of employment will also create a need to find a new doctor, especially if you happened to grow up with chronic health condition. So, how do you find a doctor who will meet your medical needs, that will be covered by your health plan, and who will give you the care you are looking for?

Before you start looking for a new doctor, think about what you want:

- Is where the office located important? Will you need help with transportation?
- Do you need an office that is wheelchair accessible or do you need other special assistance in the doctor's office?
- Are office hours convenient? How do you contact the doctor at other times?
- What hospital do you want to use, and is this doctor on the staff there?
- Do you want someone who will take time with you during an office visit or are you comfortable being seen by someone who is "good" in his or her field but perhaps does not have the best bedside manner?
- Is it important that this new doctor is knowledgeable about your special health care needs or do you think you can provide that information or connect the new doctor with those who could provide medical insight?

Ways to look for a new doctor include:

- ♦ Ask your current doctor.
- ♦ Check out the doctor your parents or other family members see.
- ♦ Call a family support group or adult disability agency and check around.
- ♦ Ask adults who have health needs similar to yours for recommendations.
- ♦ Refer to your health insurance company booklet of approved providers.
- ♦ Ask a Vocational Rehabilitation or Independent Living Center counselor.
- ♦ Contact the Medical Society, American Academy of Family Practitioners, or Internal Medicine Society.

Since your wellness depends on the medical services you receive, it is important that you are comfortable talking with your new doctor and feel that he or she understands your concerns.

Consider scheduling a "get-acquainted" interview before you make a final choice of a new doctor. You will have to pay for this visit, as it is NOT covered by insurance benefits. An ideal interview time is about 15 minutes and should not waste your time or the doctor's.

The best time to see a new physician is when your health condition is stable so you aren't asking for crisis care while seeing if you can develop a working relationship.

Think about (and write down) questions that are important to you:

- ♦ Is the doctor knowledgeable about your health issues and/or willing to learn from you and from previous doctors?
- ♦ Do you like the communication style with the doctor and in the office?
- ♦ Are you satisfied with office practices and access during an emergency or in urgent situations?
- ♦ Do you have access to hospitals and specialists if you need them?

Doctors who like to care for children are different from doctors who like to care for adults. For this reason, young adults seeking health care need certain skills:

- ♦ Ability and willingness to tell the doctor about your history, current symptoms, lifestyle, and self-care in just a few minutes (including carrying your own records and a summary of your medical history).
- ♦ Ability to ask questions about your condition and how it will affect your school, work, recreation, and social life.
- ♦ Ability to tell the doctor about your needs for education, technology, and accommodations and how your condition affects or might be affected by these.
- ♦ Willingness to follow medical recommendations that have been mutually developed by you and your doctor.
- ♦ More independence in following up with referrals and keeping all agencies informed.
- ♦ More involvement in keeping yourself well with diet and weight control, exercise and recreation, following medication, treatment and hygiene regimens, limiting risk-taking behaviors (such as drinking alcohol, smoking, taking non-prescription drugs, or unsafe sexual practices), and getting help when you feel angry, lonely, or sad for long periods.
- ♦ Being more aware of your physical and mental symptoms and health needs before you have a serious medical crisis and knowing when to inform your doctor.
- ♦ Developing a plan of action for when you need emergency care: when to consult with the doctor, what hospital to report to, what care you want and do not want, and naming someone who can let your wishes be known if you cannot (Health Care Durable Power of Attorney, see page 40-41).
- ♦ Understanding how the health care benefits / insurance plan you have works for you: when to call for pre-approval, how to get reimbursements, what services are not covered, and how to file an appeal if you do not agree with decisions from the plan.
- ♦ Recognizing that as you become more capable in directing your care that you, not your parents, should make medical appointments, be the most knowledgeable about your health needs, know when to seek guidance in solving problems, and demonstrate that you are capable and competent and ready for adulthood!

New Hampshire Vocational Rehabilitation (NHVR) is an agency within the Department of Education that helps persons with disabilities help themselves to get a job, keep the job, and develop a lifetime career. NHVR has seven regional offices throughout the state designed to assist persons who have physical, mental, emotional and learning disabilities.

A person is eligible if:

They have a disability, and their disability creates substantial problems in preparing for a job, getting a job, or keeping a job, and they require VR services to become employed or to stay employed.

Applying for VR services, is done through the local VR office.

By bringing current medical information documenting the disability, a determination of eligibility for VR services may be made at the first meeting. For this reason, it would be helpful if any medical records that would assist in this process be brought to the first meeting.

A counselor meets with the client to develop an employment plan designed to meet their specific needs. Each one of the services in the employment plan assists in reaching a chosen job. Not everyone will need every service. Some of the services provided are:

Primary VR Services:

Diagnostic Testing: This involves, if necessary, medical or psychological exams. These exams may be used to determine eligibility for VR services and the need for specific types of services.

Vocational Evaluation: This involves aptitude, interest and other specific tests to assist in planning for the right job.

Vocational Counseling: The counselor will help the client decide which work opportunities are best. Services could include: help with the skills to find and keep the right job, writing a resume, practice in doing interviews, and following job leads. Academic training could include college or technical courses.

Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation

Special Services:

Physical and Intellectual Disabilities : If medical treatment is needed to correct, improve or prevent deterioration of a disability, this service may be provided.

Transition From School to Work: Transition services refer to the services that youth with disabilities require in order to make a successful adjustment to work and community living.

Assistive Technology: VR will supply appropriate application of technological devices to support a person's performance in a job situation.

Supported Employment: These programs are designed for persons who need long-term support to hold a job in the community. Persons in supported employment are placed in competitive jobs with workers without disabilities and receive ongoing support services.

Independent Living Services: Information and Referral, Advocacy, Peer Counseling, Personal Care Attendant Coordination, and Assistive Technology may be available for individuals with severe disabilities.

Support Services:

Interpreter Services - may include foreign language, sign language or oral interpreters.

Transportation - as needed during the VR program for completion of the employment plan.

There is no charge for services; however, clients may be required to financially participate in certain services in their Rehabilitation Program. Clients are also required to take advantage of any insurance or other programs for which they may be eligible.

Guardianship

- ♦ RSA 464-A is the New Hampshire Statute that covers all guardianship procedures and
- ♦ RSA 547-B is the New Hampshire Statute that describes public guardianship programs.

Guardianship

Parents are guardians for their children until they turn 18. Once they turn 18 they are entitled to make all of their own decisions regarding where they live, how to manage their money and any decisions about their health care. If a young person is unable to make these decisions the courts can appoint a guardian to help them. An appointed guardian may be a parent, another family member, a friend or someone from the Public Guardians Office.

A guardian is appointed when a person is unable to process information and then recognize the consequences of the choices they make. A guardian can be appointed for different areas of a young person's life. For instance, a guardian who looks after an "estate". This would involve finances and any legal documents or contracts that may need to be signed. Someone may also be appointed as "Guardian of the Person". This means that the guardian would make decisions about things such as medical care and living arrangements. A guardian could be appointed over both of these areas of the person's life.

If you have questions about guardianship you can contact either of the agencies below or you may also be able to obtain information from a mental health center, area agency, or an attorney. To obtain the forms to file for guardianship you should contact your county probate court office.

Temporary Guardianship

It is possible for someone to request guardianship for a temporary period of time. This is usually done under the Emergency Temporary Guardianship guidelines and will cover a 60 day period. This may be helpful during a crisis situation when a person may not be able to make a safe decision. The goal would always be to return guardianship to the individual as soon as they are able to make those decisions themselves.

Power of Attorney

A person may choose to give Power of Attorney to someone if they would like them to be able to make decisions on their behalf regarding medical and/or financial concerns. This is a contract between two people and does not involve the courts. You can also cancel this agreement at any time for any reason. Most Power of Attorney agreements are prepared by a lawyer. A "Health Care Power of Attorney" form can usually be obtained from the hospital.

Less Restrictive Alternatives

The law says the court should only appoint a guardian if there are no available alternative resources to make sure the person stays safe, well, and gets the services they need, and that their property and money is handled prudently. Some alternatives include:

- ☑ A mentor—Someone to assist in decision making.
- ☑ A representative payee for Social Security - This person receives a person's Social Security on their behalf and assist them in money management.
- ☑ Revocable Power of Attorney. A person may choose to give Power of Attorney to someone if they would like them to be able to make decisions on their behalf regarding medical and/or financial concerns. This is a contract between two people and does not involve the courts. This agreement can be cancelled at any time for any reason. Most Power of Attorney agreements are prepared by a lawyer. A "Health Care Power of Attorney" form can usually be obtained from a hospital.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

Under the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, a child from birth to age 18 may receive monthly payments based on disability (or blindness) if:

- he or she has an impairment or combination of impairments that meets the definition of disability for children; and
- the income and resources of the parents and the child are within the allowed limits.

At age 18 a young person may apply for SSI, but will be found eligible under the requirements for adult. The parents income and resources will no longer be counted, but the young persons income and resources will be.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is a program financed through general tax revenues. SSI disability benefits are payable to adults or children who are disabled or blind, who have limited income and resources, who meet the living arrangement requirements, and are otherwise eligible. The monthly payment varies up to the maximum federal benefit rate which is standardized in all States, but not everyone gets the same amount because it may be supplemented by the State or decreased by other countable income and resources.

Social Security Disability Insurance and Survivor's Benefits

Children may qualify for Social Security payments through a parent's disability or retirement benefits (SSDI) even after age 18.

Social Security survivor's benefits can be paid to, among others:

- ♦ A widow or widower at any age if he or she takes care of the deceased's child who is under age 16 or disabled, and receives Social Security benefits.
- ♦ Unmarried children under 18, or under age 19 if they are attending elementary or secondary school full time.
- ♦ Children at any age who are disabled before age 22 and remain disabled.

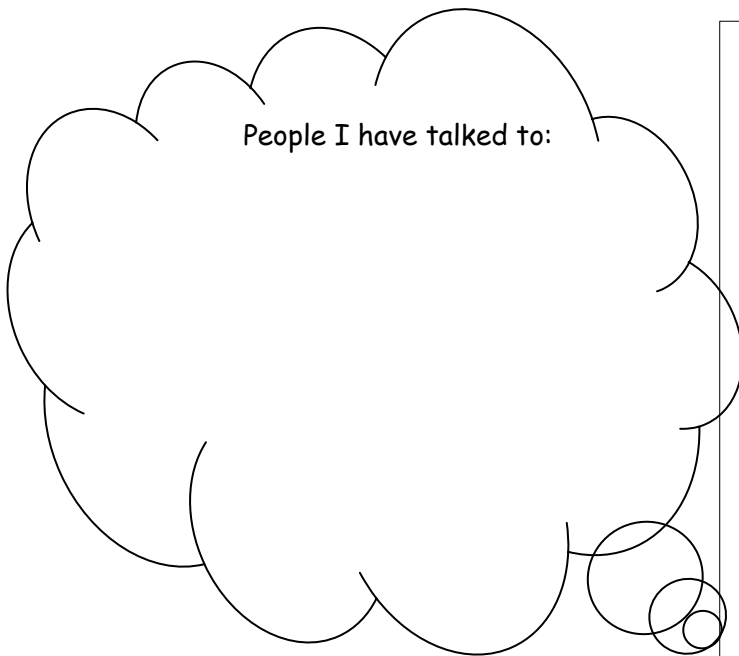

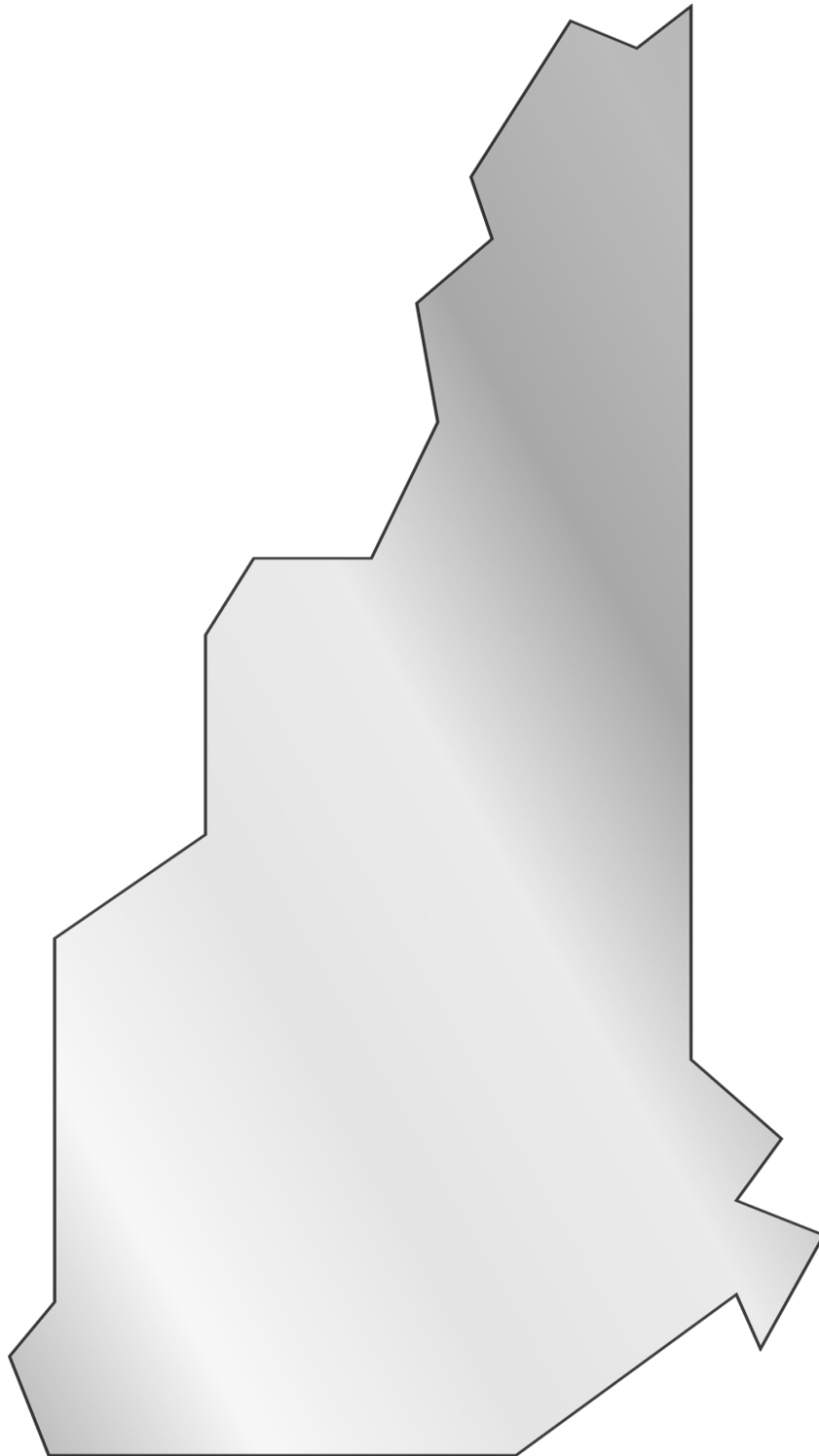

The NH Department of Health and Human Services is an agency that helps people in partnership with families, community groups, private providers, other governmental agencies and many thousands of foster parents, neighbors, and citizens. The majority of the people who use programs and services have multiple needs and require services from more than one program.

DHHS is responsible for many of the regulatory, programmatic, and financial aspects of NH's health care system and plays a key role in the planning, delivery and financing of health care.

It provides social and support services to families with chronically ill or disabled members and to families in crisis. DHHS also provides economic supports including child care funding, financial grants, employment support services, medical assistance, food assistance and child support services. Financial and social services are provided, to a large extent, through a network of 11 District Offices located across NH.

Behavioral health services are made available through Community Mental Health Centers, institutions such as the Glencliff Home for the Elderly, New Hampshire's Acute Care Psychiatric Facility and the Tirrell House.

People with developmental disabilities receive community-based services through a system of non-profit Area Agencies. In addition, DHHS provides services through networks of contractual providers, both public and private. Local contractors complement and expand DHHS' capacity to provide community-based services.

The Division of Family Assistance (DFA) administers programs and services for eligible NH residents providing financial, medical and food & nutritional assistance, help with child care costs, and emergency help to obtain and keep safe housing.

Family assistance staff determine initial and continuing eligibility. The amount of benefits and delivery of benefits is determined using federal and NH guidelines and policies. There are seven major types of assistance administered by DFA for NH residents. The following is a brief description of those assistance types.

These services are accessed through the DHHS District Office (DO).

- ♦ **Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)** - The State of NH allows the maximum lifetime limit for TANF assistance of 60 months.
 - NH Employment Program - The New Hampshire Employment Program (NHEP) is an employment support program that provides cash assistance to eligible families with able-bodied parents and assists those parents in becoming self-sufficient by promoting work through the provision of employment support and training services.
 - Family Assistance Program - The Family Assistance Program (FAP) provides cash assistance to eligible households with dependent children that are headed by adults who have:
 - a permanent disability;
 - long-term obstacles to employment; or
 - are over age 60.

The program also provides cash assistance for children living with a non-parent caretaker relative, such as an aunt, grandparent or adult sibling. There are no work requirements for adults receiving assistance through FAP.

- **Child Care Assistance** - Child Care Assistance assists parents engaged in work, training or educational activities. Payments to child care providers are coordinated by DFA in cooperation with the Child Development Bureau.

NHDHHS Division of Family Assistance

- **Emergency Assistance** - The Emergency Assistance Program is available to those who meet all the requirements for the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program (TANF). It helps families with children who are facing a housing or utility crisis and are without resources to resolve the crisis. Permanent housing payments under Emergency Assistance help eligible families get or keep safe and healthy housing by providing funds for rent or utility security deposits, home heating fuel deliveries, or past due rent, mortgage and utility bills.
- **Employment and Training Programs and Support Services** - The New Hampshire Employment Program (NHEP) is an employment support program that provides cash assistance to eligible families with able-bodied parents and assists those parents in becoming self-sufficient by promoting work through the provision of employment support and training services.
- ♦ **Food and Nutritional Program** - Assistance assists individuals and families through the Food Stamp program.
- ♦ **Medical Coverage** The Division of Family Assistance (DFA) determines financial eligibility and all non-financial eligibility, with the exception of medical necessity determinations, for Medicaid and NH Healthy Kids for children under the age of 19, pregnant women, low-income families with children, blind individuals, refugees, non-citizens, seniors and disabled adults.
- ♦ **State Supplemental Programs (SSP-Cash)** - State Supplemental cash assistance supports elderly adults, individuals that are physically disabled, mentally disabled or legally blind. Eligibility and benefit amounts for the State Supplement Programs depend on the individual and spouse's income, resources and on living arrangement. Services are provided for eligible individuals through the following programs:
 - Old Age Assistance (OAA)
 - Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled (APTD)
 - Aid to the Needy Blind (ANB).

Responsible for the administration of Medical Assistance program. OMBP's development and facilitation of program policy and financial management for Medicaid services, assists other DHHS program areas manage specialized Medicaid programs for the aged, blind and disabled, mental health, developmentally disabled, and long term care residents.

Other health program initiatives such as NH's Healthy Kids Insurance Program (Child Health Insurance Program - CHIP) and Pharmacy Benefits Management are administered under contract. Family Assistance (DFA) determines financial eligibility and categorical eligibility and the Medicaid Administration determines medical eligibility when it is required. The program provides payment for medical services ranging from routine preventive medical care for children to institutional care for the elderly and disabled.

Medicaid is a federal and state funded health care program that serves a wide range of needy individuals and families who meet certain eligibility requirements. The program works to ensure that eligible adults and children have access to needed health care services by enrolling and paying providers to deliver covered services to eligible recipients.

♥ *It is important to note that Medicaid Health programs have different eligibility criteria but the service benefits offered are the same for all programs once eligibility is determined. Children and adults have different service benefits.*

Children and Adults

- **Healthy Kids:** provides health care access to NH's uninsured children by promoting healthy lifestyles, encouraging preventive health and dental care, treating illness early and managing chronic health conditions. For general medical coverage and coverage for severe disabilities.
- **Aid to the Needy Blind (ANB):** a category of eligibility that requires an individual (of any age) to be diagnosed as legally blind. The visual acuity in the better eye can be no greater than 20/200;
- **Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled (APTD):** an adult service category that requires individuals between ages 18 to 64 to meet the Social Security impairment severity requirements and to be unable to perform substantial gainful activity for 48 consecutive months as a result of the impairment;
- **Health Insurance Premium Payment Program:** Individuals who are eligible for any of the various Medicaid programs and who have access to other health insurance plans may be eligible for the HIPPP Program;
- **Home Care for Children with Severe Disabilities (HC-CSD):** commonly known as the Katie Beckett option: for severely disabled children up to age 19 whose medical disability qualifies them for institutional care but are cared for at home;
- **Home and Community Based Care for Acquired Brain Disorders (HCBC-ABD):** services are available to individuals with traumatic brain injuries or neurological disorders who chose to remain in community settings in lieu of institutionalization;
- **Home and Community Based Care for Developmentally Disabled (HCBC-DD):** services are available to individuals with developmental disabilities and their families who chose to remain in community settings in lieu of institutionalization;

- **Medicaid for Employed Adults with Disabilities (MEAD):** allows individuals who qualify for Medicaid to be gainfully employed, save money and still keep Medicaid as a result of a sliding scale buy-in component
- **Home and Community Based Care for the Elderly and Chronically Ill (HCBC-ECI):** managed by the Division of Elderly and Adult Services (DEAS), these services provide options to eligible individuals who chose to remain in community settings in lieu of nursing home care.
- **Nursing Facility Care:** managed by DEAS, these services provide support to qualified seniors or disabled individuals who are residents in a nursing or assisted care facility.

Bureau of Maternal and Child Health administers a broad array of programs. Community health agencies around the state receive funds through contracts with BMCH to deliver services to pregnant women and their infants including prenatal care, child health services, family planning and home visiting services. BMCH staff develop program guidelines based on best practices and monitor the performance and quality of services delivered.

BMCH also administers these programs:

- ♦ The **Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) Program** offers information, support and resources to family and care providers of infants suspected to have died of SIDS.
- ♦ The **Newborn Screening Program** monitors the blood screening of all infants born in NH for as many as 32 potentially serious disorders and ensures immediate follow-up for abnormal results.
- ♦ The **Early Hearing Detection & Intervention** screens newborns for possible hearing loss or deafness to ensure timely and appropriate intervention.
- ♦ The **Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program** - seeks to eliminate exposure to lead through development and enforcement of regulations, professional and public education, certification of lead paint professionals, inspections of suspected sources of lead, monitoring of reported blood lead levels and case management for individuals with elevated lead levels.

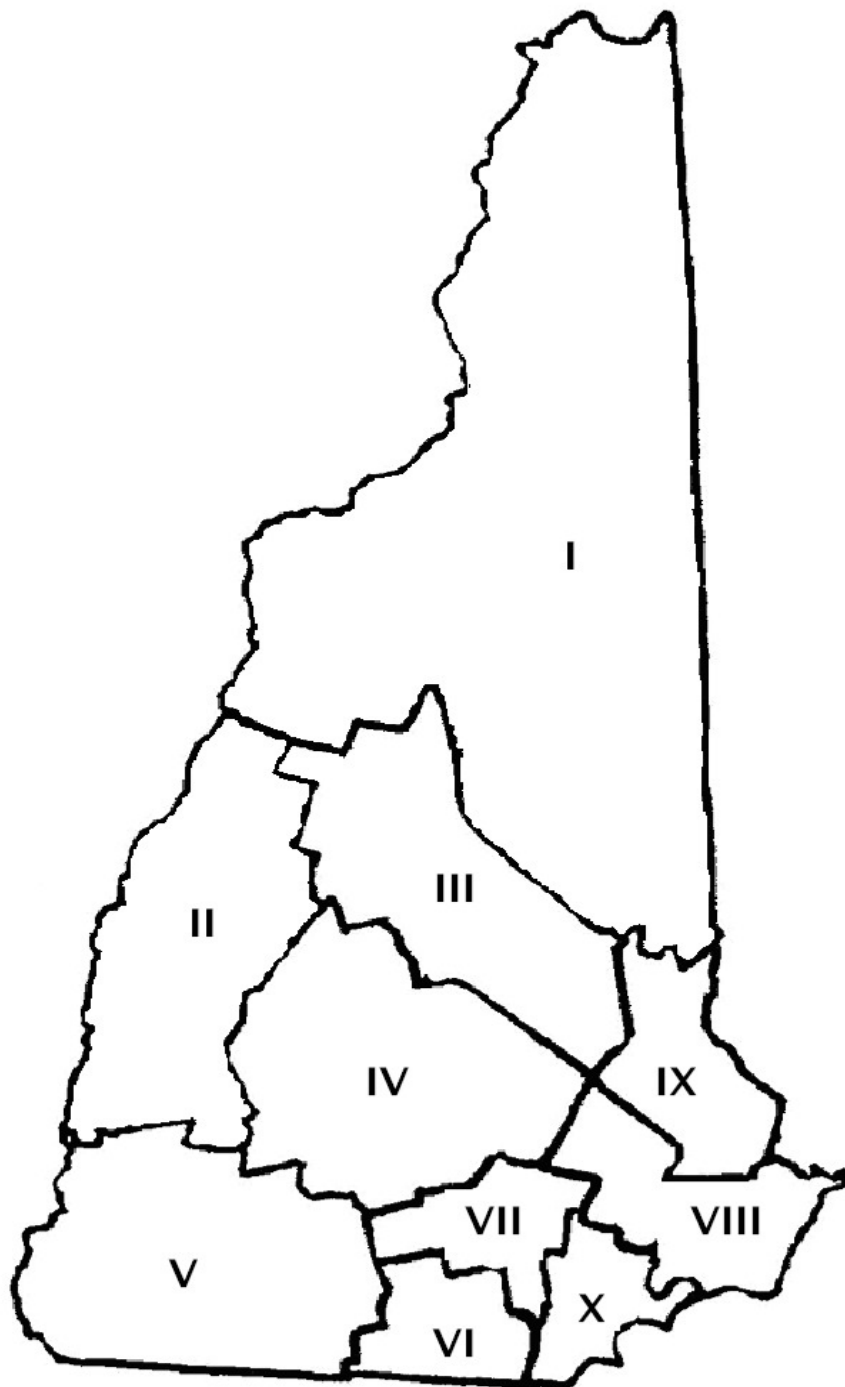

The Division of Developmental Services (DDS) works with NH's developmental services system to ensure public resources are used effectively to support individuals and families in their community. The NH developmental services system offers its consumers with developmental disabilities and acquired brain disorders a wide range of supports and services within their own communities. DDS is comprised of a main office in Concord and 10 designated non-profit and specialized service agencies that represent specific geographic regions of NH; the community agencies are commonly referred to as Area Agencies.

All direct services and supports to individuals and families are provided in accordance with contractual agreements between DDS and the Area Agencies. Supports include service coordination, day and vocational services, personal care services, community support services, assistive technology services, specialty services and flexible family supports including respite services and environmental modifications.

Funding for supports and services for people with developmental disabilities and acquired brain disorders in NH is provided through two primary mechanisms: the Medicaid Home and Community Based Care Waiver and funds commonly referred to as "state flexible funding."

DDS operates three Medicaid Home and Community Based Care Waivers. The Home and Community Based Care For Individuals with Developmental Disabilities waiver (HCBC-DD), The Home and Community Based Care For Individuals with Acquired Brain Disorders waiver (HCBC-ABD) and the In Home Supports (HCBC-HIS) for children with developmental disabilities.

The NH developmental services system offers its consumers with developmental disabilities and acquired brain disorders a wide range of supports and services within their own communities. The Area Agency System is comprised of 10 designated non-profit and specialized service agencies

All direct services and supports to individuals and families are provided through the Area Agencies. Supports include service coordination, day and vocational services, personal care services, community support services, assistive technology services, specialty services and flexible family supports including respite services and environmental modifications.

Family Support Services

The Developmental Services system offers consumers with developmental disabilities and acquired brain disorders a wide range of family supports and services within their own communities.

In 1989 the NH Legislature passed legislation spelling out NH's commitment to aiding families who care for children or adult family members with disabilities at home and created a comprehensive statewide family support network. The general court recognized that families are the greatest resource available to individuals who are disabled and they must be supported in their role as primary caregivers. Supporting families in their effort to care for their family members at home is efficient and cost effective.

Any NH family whose family member is found eligible for developmental services or acquired brain disorder services is eligible for family support services. Supports include respite services and environmental modifications along with more flexible family supports including information and referral, advocacy and assistive technology services.

Each local region has established a Regional Family Support Council consisting of members who have a disabled family member. The Family Support Council provides advice to the area agency in the development of family support plans and monitors the services provided pursuant to the plan. Each local agency also has a family support coordinator to assist families to acquire supports and services.

The Bureau of Behavioral Health (BBH) works to ensure the provision of efficient and effective services to those citizens who are most severely and persistently disabled by mental, emotional, and behavioral dysfunction as defined by NH laws and rules. To this end, BBH has divided the entire state into community mental health regions. Each of the ten regions has a BBH contracted Community Mental Health Center and many regions have Peer Support Agencies.

Psychiatric Emergency & Crisis Services

Services are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to any person in the state of New Hampshire who may be experiencing psychiatric distress. If you are dealing with an immediate Crisis you must call 911 or visit the emergency room at your local hospital, or contact your local community mental health center.

An after-hours assessment usually takes place at an Emergency Department of a local hospital. A master level clinician, in conjunction with a psychiatrist if necessary, completes the assessment. An assessment may determine the need for immediate care in a hospital or another community residential alternative.

Assessments conducted at a local hospital usually include admission to the Emergency Department and evaluation to ensure you are physically stable. Blood work, a basic physical, a neurological exam or other tests as necessary may be ordered.

A determination about safety will be made and a plan about the need for services and when services are needed will be made. If the Emergency Services clinician determines there is a danger to the patient or others, a hospitalization will be arranged.

Community Mental Health Centers

Community Mental Health Centers are private full service clinics which offer a wide variety of programs such as individual and group therapy, medications, and symptom management. They also provide special intensive services to persons who meet the BBH eligibility requirements because they have a severe mental illness or emotional disability.

Peer Support Agencies

The Peer Support Agencies (PSAs) are private not-for-profit agencies that have contracted with BBH. PSAs provide help to people with mental illness who are 18 years of age or older and who identify themselves as a recipient, a former recipient, or a person who is at significant risk of becoming a recipient of publicly funded mental health services.

Community Mental Health Centers (CMHC)

Each of the ten regions provides many outpatient mental health services to children and adults who qualify for services, regardless of their ability to pay. To be eligible for services, your child must be assessed and found to be in need of services provided at the center, which can include the following:

- Assessment (part of the intake procedure)
- Individual, group, and family counseling
- Evaluation and testing
- Case management, including coordinating community-based support and treatment (wraparound services)
- Medication administration and monitoring
- Mental Illness Management Services (MIMS)
- Limited emergency mental health services (24 hours/day)

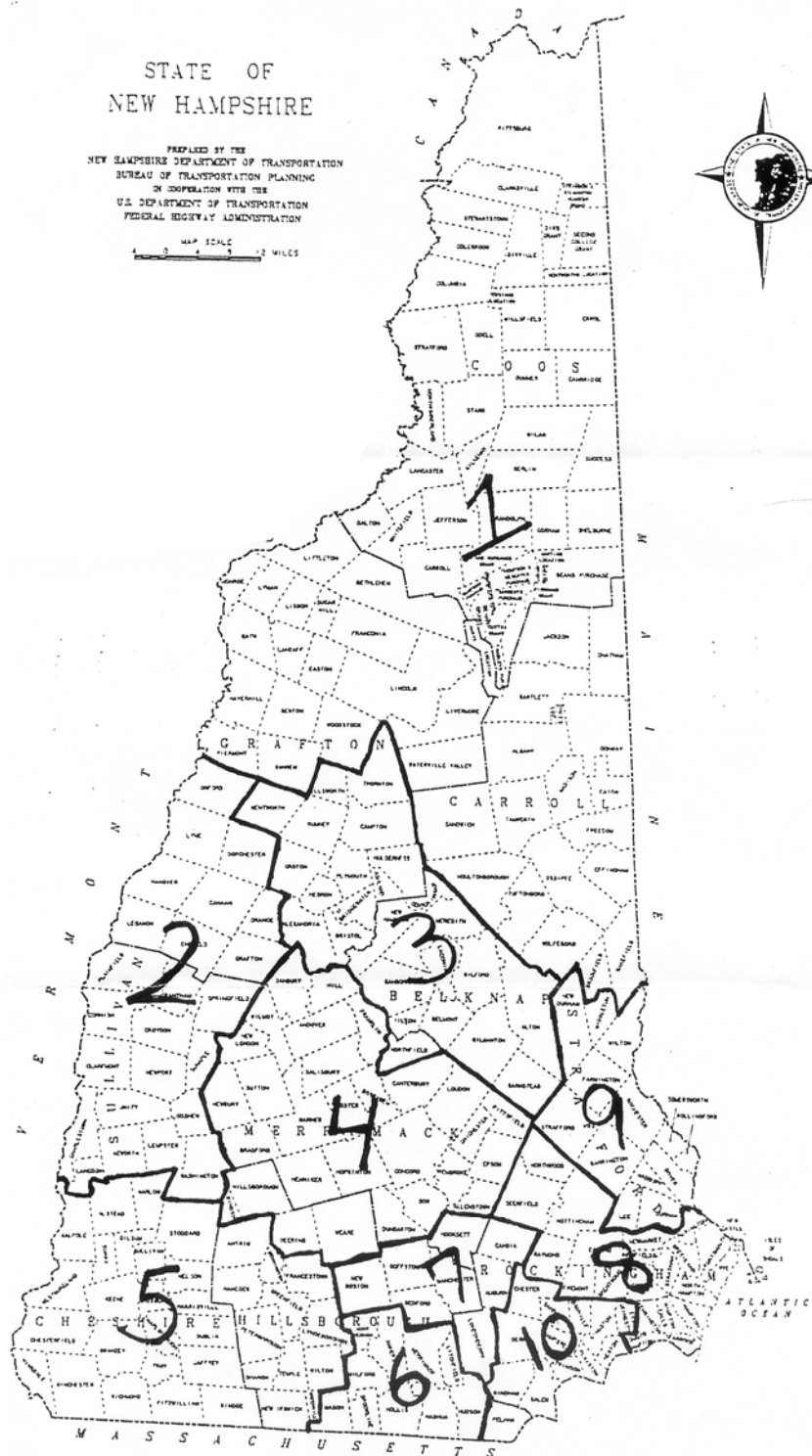
❖ You might have to wait to receive some of the services listed above, because the requests for services are often greater than the number staff members can handle.

Community Mental Health Centers are staffed by a variety of practitioners, including nurse practitioners, clinical social workers, clinical psychologists, psychiatric nurses, and mental health counselors. In addition, each center has a director of children's services. However, centers differ from each other in staffing, the way services are provided, and the role that families play in the treatment process.

If you find that you are not being included as a partner on your child's treatment team, step forward and speak to your child's case manager or therapist about becoming a part of the team. Since your signature will be required on the treatment plan, you should be a part of the treatment team that develops the treatment plan. Be certain that you receive a copy of the treatment plan after you sign it.

Community mental health services accept private insurance as well as Medicaid and Medicare. Check to see if your insurance company will cover the services of CMHCs. CMHCs also offer a sliding scale of fees based on your family's ability to pay.

Peer Support Agencies

The Peer Support Agencies They are private not-for-profit agencies that have contracted with the Bureau of Behavioral Health (BBH). Peer support agencies provide services to people with mental illness who are 18 years of age or older and self-identify as a recipient, former recipient, or as at significant risk of becoming a recipient of publicly funded mental health services.

Peer support services are provided by and for people with a mental illness and are designed to assist people with their recovery. Peer support consists of supportive interactions based on shared experience among people and are intended to assist people to understand their potential to achieve their personal goals. Interactions are based on trust, respect, and mutual support. Peer support agencies accomplish this by providing choice, using non-medical approaches to help, sharing decision making, encouraging informed decision making about all aspects of people's lives, challenging perceived self-limitations, etc.

Services include, but are not limited to: face-to-face and telephone peer support; outreach; monthly educational events; activities that promote self-advocacy; wellness training; after hours warm line; crisis respite (24 hours, short-term, non-medical crisis program).

All peer support agency locations are accessible by wheelchair except where noted.

The Division of Elderly and Adult Services (DEAS) provides a variety of social and long-term supports to adults between the ages of 18 and 60 and those adults who have a chronic illness or disability.

These services range from home care, meals on wheels, care management, transportation assistance and assisted living to nursing home care. Legal support services, advocacy for disabled adults, information and assistance regarding Medicare, and information about volunteer opportunities are also important support services provided in the community by BEAS. All services and supports are intended to assist people to live as independently as possible in safety and with dignity.

A critical component of the BEAS statewide delivery system is its community-based provider network; many of these providers are nonprofit agencies. BEAS coordinates long-term care support services at the local level. BEAS staff are located at eleven DHHS District Offices (see page 105) throughout NH and coordinate services to seniors and adults with disabilities and chronic illnesses who meet certain eligibility criteria. DEAS also has a main office located in Concord. The main office is responsible for administrative support and general program and financial planning.

A major partnership between DEAS and local communities is ServiceLink, (see page 147) a statewide network of community-based resources for seniors, adults living with disabilities and their families. ServiceLink partners promote the independence and well-being of the people they serve at thirteen primary locations and many satellites throughout NH.

The Family Caregiver Support Program offers: Adult day, in-home, overnight and weekend in-facility (assisted living or skilled nursing) respite options, assistive technology, supplies, emergency response, home modification/repairs, information and assistance, transportation homemaker/chore/ personal care, and family consultation, education and support groups. Though the NH Family Caregiver Support Program eligible grandparents and relatives can receive respite services such as in-home child care, after school programs and camps.

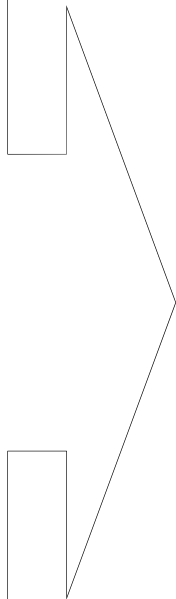

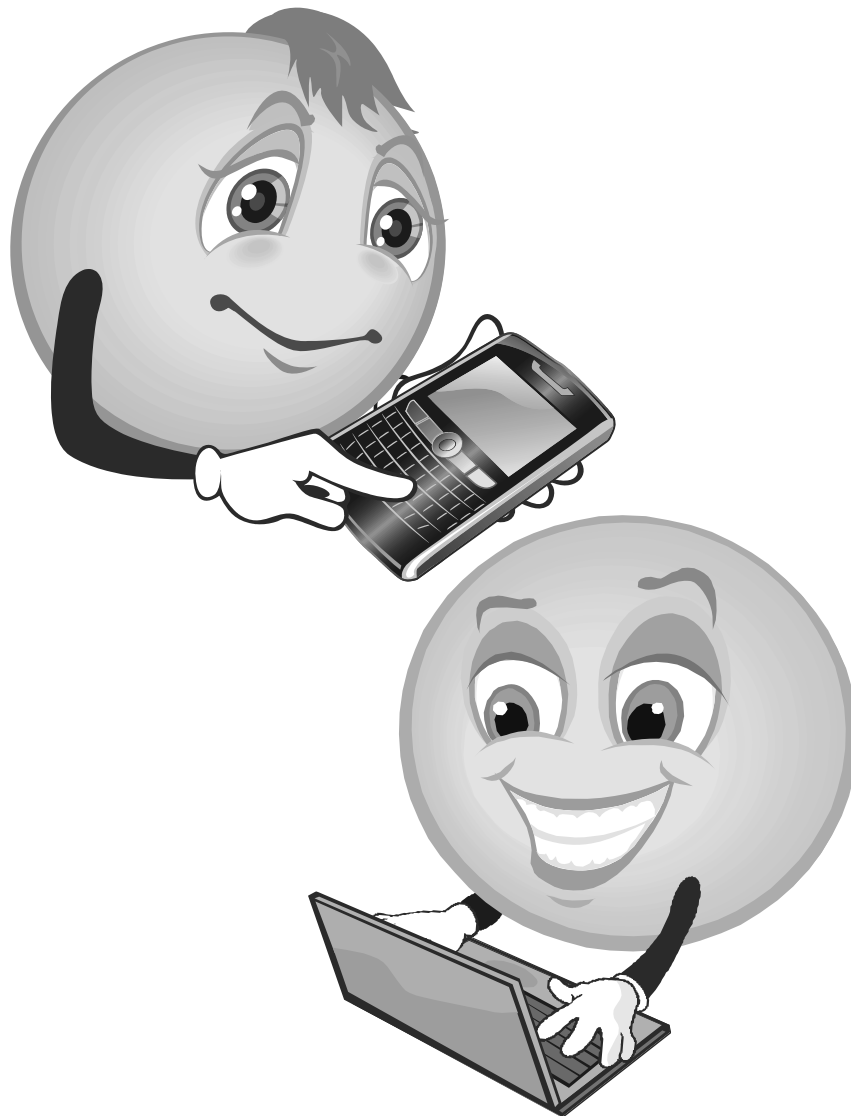
